



AUGUST WAS AN ASTONISHING MONTH AND WAS UNQUESTIONABLY MY MOST CHALLENGING IN 19 YEARS OF SCHOOL LEADERSHIP.

Here's what occurred at St. Marcus:

August 10: Violent storms swept through southeastern Wisconsin. The North Campus lower level flooded due to a failed

sump pump. The new Harambee Campus, due to open in a week, lost power for five days and renovations ceased.

August 15: Power returns to the Harambee Campus and renovations resume.

August 17: New and returning St. Marcus scholars start their first day of the 2021-2022 school year. 1,050 scholars, including 154 new K4 through 2nd graders at the Harambee Campus, are ready to learn.

August 20: Two classes at the Harambee Campus enter a two-week quarantine for potential exposure to the Delta variant of coronavirus. School leadership responded swiftly to ensure protocols were maintained to keep the school open and as many children in seats as possible.

August 23: A late summer heat wave hit the Midwest as temperatures climbed into the mid 90s in Milwaukee. Scholars, teachers, and staff persevered through the heat, especially at the non-air conditioned Harambee Campus.

As you can see, the commencement of this school year has been nothing short of tumultuous - specifically for the Harambee Campus which already witnessed construction delays because of pandemic-related supply chain and city permitting issues throughout the summer.

Staff at all levels grappled with the impact of the pandemic on student learning loss and reduction in social and emotional competencies amongst students. Recent Forward exam data regarding the full extent of the pandemic's impact on education in Wisconsin, and especially in Milwaukee, will be sure to shock and sadden those of us who lament inequality and inequity in educational spaces.

Despite the obvious challenges that St. Marcus faced at the start of the school year, I was overwhelmed with pride in our community for coming together for the sake of Milwaukee's future leaders. Here's what I felt:

Gratitude: Despite the chaos of opening the Harambee Campus, I feel a deep and abiding gratitude for our staff, teachers, scholars' families, and donors.

Perspective: To have the ability to open a third campus despite obvious obstacles and to have over 1,000 Milwaukee scholars learning in a St. Marcus classroom this school year exemplifies the commitment and dedication of so many supporters. Wins like this make a difference despite seemingly distressing situations.

Resilience: The success of tens of thousands of children in our city is denied due to broken families, systemic poverty, and chronically substandard schools. We must be resilient and steadfast in refusing to give up until every child in our city has access to high-quality education.

Joy: What a joy it was to watch dozens of volunteers, church members, and donors rally to defy the challenges and make sure that the Harambee Campus opened on time. It was an even bigger joy to watch those young Harambee scholars walk through the doors in their school uniforms. Parents were beaming with pride. It's also been a joy to watch St. Marcus staff come together to adapt to new challenges in what was already an almost impossible task.

Through all of this, I'm reminded of David's words in Psalm 27, "Though an army besiege me, my heart will not fear; though war break out against me, even then will I be confident...I remain confident of this, I will see the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living. Wait for the Lord; be strong and take heart and wait for the Lord."

Friends - let's not waiver in our personal and professional lives and in our acts of service. Let's rally together in resilience, joy, and gratitude and see what our great God does in and through us!

Harambee Campus First Day


Harambee Campus opened on August 17 to 154 K4 through 2nd grade scholars.



AN ARTISTIC PARTNERSHIP

SPEEDING CARS AND RECKLESS DRIVING HAVE BECOME MORE APPARENT ON NORTH AVENUE,

where the St. Marcus Main Campus resides - putting the community and 600 scholars, staff, and parents at risk during arrival and dismissal. Thanks to a partnership between St. Marcus, Safe & Sound, and Artists Working in Education, there are now four vibrant crosswalks in Harambee that make the area a little bit safer and more colorful.

Maureen Gunn, a St. Marcus church member who joined the school as a community engagement specialist this past January, and scholars Jazale and Joshua who created images that can be found in the designs, participated in the project to advocate for safe driving on Milwaukee's North Side. They worked alongside Safe & Sound, a local nonprofit that focuses on community development to build safe and empowered neighborhoods in Milwaukee, and Artists Working in Education, a local nonprofit that seeks to provide art enrichment programs to area youth.

The project, titled "Cross/Words/North", brought artists, students, and residents living in Harambee and Riverwest to create the four crosswalks that symbolize the beauty and resources of the neighborhoods. Each crosswalk features an image that symbolizes a particular word: empowerment, love, unity, and diversity.

"This community art crosswalk project is a collaborative mosaic," Maureen said. "It has beautifully brought together individuals from our city government, community organizations, schools, art community, concerned parents, and community residents."

Two crosswalks are on North Palmer Street and two are on North Hubbard Street. The project had the support of Alderwoman Milele Coggs and is a small part of Mayor Tom Barrett's efforts to address and decrease reckless driving in Milwaukee.

Kole Knueppel joined St. Marcus in July as Associate Executive Director.

But Kole isn't new to St. Marcus.



He led the revitalization of St. Marcus from a low-performing school into a nationally-recognized model for faith-based, "no excuses" urban education from 2001 to 2004. He brings over 20 years of leadership experience, having led the expansion of HOPE Christian Schools, from one campus with 50 students to three campuses serving over 500 students. He served as the director of Wisconsin Lutheran's Center for Urban Teaching (CfUT), where he trained urban teachers and school leaders. He co-founded Schools That Can Milwaukee (now City Forward Collective) driving the growth of high-quality urban Milwaukee schools from three founding schools to a network serving over 30 schools and nearly 15,000 students. Most recently, he served as the founding director of the Center for Transformational Educational Leadership at the University of Notre Dame, training principals at urban schools in Chicago.



Kole also served as a professor in the Mary Ann Remick Leadership Program, a nationally renowned program for school leaders from around the country seeking a Masters Degree in educational leadership.

In his new role at St. Marcus, Kole is leading community engagement efforts. His focus is on how to best walk alongside and invest in 689 school families. His team is working with parents so they can flourish spiritually and financially by connecting them to job and home ownership opportunities all while making sure their children receive a great education. His team seeks to create programs and work with community partners which have meaningful impact and are a good fit for families. With the addition of a third campus in the Harambee neighborhood, Kole is focused on St. Marcus' involvement in community revitalization efforts and building a healthy, strong neighborhood.

Kole is also focused on leadership development - building a strong pipeline of church and school leaders and training emerging leaders as our school network grows, as well as assisting in strategic direction for the school.

Kole has a B.S. in English with a Secondary Education Certificate from Wisconsin Lutheran, a M.S. in Educational Administration from UW-Milwaukee and is now completing his Ph.D. at UW-Milwaukee.

Why are you excited to be back at St. Marcus?

I am personally humbled and honored to be back. I've lived in the Harambee neighborhood for 20 years - now with my wife Anna and two kids, Sophia and Atticus.
