


IT WON'T SAVE MONEY

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DOS AND DON'TS OF DIY

A quick and handy guide to keeping ants outside where they belong.





DO: TAKE OUT THE TRASH

Dispose of garbage regularly – in the meantime, keep trash bins well-sealed.



DON'T: LEAVE FOOD OPEN

Store pantry items in airtight containers or sealed bags. Clean up any food debris in cabinets & pantries.



DO: REMOVE WATER SOURCES

Eliminate water sources such as plumbing leaks, dishes & standing water in sinks, water around bathtubs, & even around houseplants.



DO: KEEP THINGS CLEAN

Regularly clean floors, & wipe down countertops & tables, especially after meal time.



DON'T: KEEP PET DISHES ON THE FLOOR

Food left at ground level is a surefire invitation for foraging ants. Keep pet food and water off the floor when possible, and store pet food in sealed containers.



DO: DENY ACCESS

Prevent ants getting inside in the first place by caulking small cracks & crevices around doors & utility lines, ensuring screens are intact and doors & windows close securely.
